PP books are marked first to ensure best quality feedback.</li> <li>In 2017, the gap in Progress 8 between all students compared to disadvantaged students was 0.26 (almost a quarter of a grade). In 2018, the gap in Progress 8 between all students compared to disadvantaged students was 0.18. This shows that the gap is closing and improving towards that of all students.</li> <li>The mean gaps are currently: Year 10 - 11%, Year 9 - 6%, Year 8 - 10% and Year 7 - 6%.</li> </ul>
